COMMITTEE TO MEET GUESTS

National Humane Alliance Presents
City With Drinking Fountain of
Granite and Bronze for Use
of Animals

PASADENA, June 17.—Secretary D. W. Coolidge of the board of trade has received positive assurance that the excursion party of editors will arrive in Pasadena next Monday afternoon and the directors accordingly assembled today and mapped out a program of entertainment. It is expected that the party will come over from Los Angeles at 2 o'clock and a carriage ride will be the first thing on the program. Owners of vehicles will assemble on the Raymond avenue side of Central Park. From there the drive will be along Colorado street, Arroyo drive, Grand, Orange Grove, Pasadena and other fashionable thoroughfares through the Raymond hotel grounds and over other streets to the Maryland hotel, where refreshments will be served. It is probable that a committee will meet the excursionists at Los Angeles and act as escort to this city. Souvenir books of Pasadena will be presented to each visitor.

A handsome fountain of granite and bronze is on the way to Pasadena from Chicago, and will be set up in the northeast corner of Central park as the gift of the National Humane alliance to the city of Pasadena. The fountain is to provide drink for animals and the city will only have the cost of placing it in position and providing a foundation.

NEW FOUNTAIN IS DEDICATED

PASADENA ACCEPTS HUMANE SOCIETY'S GIFT

WELCOME FOR MISS SUTTON

PASADENA, Sept. 2.—The exercises attending the dedication of the new Humane society drinking fountain this afternoon attracted a large crowd and proved of unusual interest. The crowd was seated under the cool balcony of hotel Green, adjoining the park in which the fountain is located, moving to the west of the fountain when the exercises were about to close.

Dr. H. L. Oinger, president of the Humane society, presided and introduced the several speakers in the usual pleasant manner. After the singing of "America" Miss W. D. Turner, president of the Shakespeare club, read a letter from Frances W. Brown, officer of the Chicago Club, who makes his winter home in Pasadena and through whose efforts the fountain came to Pasadena. The latter said of the gift and character of his friend, Herman Leo Brown, who founded the National Humane alliance and gave \$100,000 for furthering the work of that organization. One of the objects of this society is the giving every year of five or six public drinking fountains to cities in this country. Pasadena being the first city on the Pacific coast to profit by this unique introduction. Dr. Brown formally presented the fountain to the Pasadena Humane society.

Dr. Oinger accepted the gift in a witty speech, and in turn presented it to the city, represented by Mayor Whitehead, who in turn very graciously turned it over to the park commission. Rev. Robert J. Burdette was expected to accept the gift in the name of this commission, but was unable to be present, his place being ably filled by another commissioner, W. E. Wincham. Dr. Oinger, in introducing Dr. A. H. Lamb, president of the Los Angeles County H. P. C. A., spoke at some length of the work the Humane society hopes to do in the future, telling the crowd that he has found a man ready to donate the ground for an animal hospital midway between Pasadena and Los Angeles, and saying that all he needed to be perfectly happy was the man who would put up the building and buy an ambulance for the society to use.

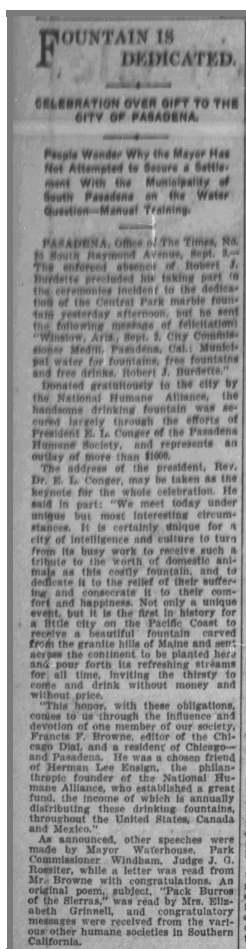
Dr. Lamb made a striking address, full of praise for Pasadena and its people, and was followed by Judge Bonter, counsel for the Pasadena H. P. C. A., who gave a scholarly talk about the society and its work. Dr. Oinger then read a poem on "The Park Burrs" of the "Sunset," written by Elizabeth Grinnell. The poem was illustrated in a novel manner by a patient long-eared burro which was led to the platform, headed for a journey. Following the poem and the reading of a number of letters and a telegram from Rev. Mr. Burdette, the crowd was led to the fountain, where all drank of the flowing water, the patient burrs being not forgotten.

During the course of the exercises the citizens club sang forthwith several resolutions. Resolutions of thanks were read by the secretary of the society and adopted by the audience thanking Dr. Brown for his friendly offer and the Humane alliance for the beautiful gift.
