Humane Alliance Arranges for its Installation.
L. M. Seaver of New York, secretary
and treasurer of the National Humane
Alilance, appeared before the board of public works today and submitted an
offer of a handsome granite drinking
fountain. The fountain will be donated
and the National Humane Alliance will pay the freight charges.
The board decided to accept the offer
and the fountain will be forthcoming I
a site suitable to Seaver can be found. It
is probable that it will be located at
Patee market, near Tenth and Lafayette streets. The city must obligate itself to
bear the expense of constructing a foun
dation and installing water. The foun
tain will bear the inscription: "Presented by the National Human
Alliance. Herman Lee Ensign Foun
Seaver explained that Ensign accumu
lated a "snug little sum" and retired from
business; that he organized the Nationa
Humane Alliance and intended to devot his attention to humane work: that he
died soon after the organization was
launched and that he left his small for
tune to the society. The executors de
cided to use the money in donating drink ing fountains to cities throughout th
United States. Sixteen were donated las
year, principally in New York. This i
the first offer made to a Missouri city.
"What will it cost to put in the foun dation?" asked President Ryan of th
board of public works.
"The fountain weighs five tons, an
the cost of foundations varies from \$
to \$250," replied Seaver. "It varies wit
the soil, the cost of labor-and sometime they say graft enters into the cost. I'n
not a politician and don't know anythin
about graft."
"The iron drinking fountains supplie
by the city cost from \$175 to \$200 each, said City Engineer Lawlor. "The founds
tion of this fountain will cost about who




