



**FOUNTAIN TO BE ERECTED ON BROADWAY.**

## WILL ERECT \$1000 FOUNTAIN FOR ANIMALS

### Horses and Dogs to Have Stone Drinking Place.

The Civic Club's fountain will soon be placed at the junction of Twenty-sixth street and Broadway. The fountain is the gift of the National Humane Alliance and will be for the use of horses and dogs.

It is formed of solid blocks of Maine granite. It is five feet six inches in height, and is polished and trimmed with bronze. The fountain represents a gift of about \$1000. Four feet from the ground is the huge bowl six feet in diameter to be kept filled with water for horses. At the base are four smaller for dogs.

To carry light at the top of the fountain there is a handsome bronze standard and globe for an incandescent light. That is to be supplied by the city. The Mayor and his men put the seal of approval upon it by appropriating \$100 for lighting apparatus.

Harrison Gray Fiske is the president of the National Humane Alliance and Lewis M. Beaver secretary.

Mrs. Charles Morris, president of the Women's Civic Improvement Club of Oakland and Mrs. Alma Kower, the secretary of the club, have been instrumental in securing the fountain for this city.

## FOUNTAIN FOR ANIMALS ARRIVES FROM EAST

### Women's Civic Improvement Club Will Erect It at Prominent Corner

OAKLAND, July 11.—The fountain presented by the National humane alliance to the city of Oakland, and obtained through the efforts of the Women's civic improvement club of this city, is at the Southern Pacific freight yards and in a few days will be mounted in concrete at Twenty-sixth street and Broadway. The fountain, which is constructed for the supplying of water to horses and dogs, is of Maine granite, five feet six inches in height, trimmed with bronze.

The gift of fountains to cities is carried on from the bequests of Herman Lee Ensign, and the president of the National humane society now is Harrison Gray Fiske. Lewis M. Seaver is secretary. The women who represented the civic club in the negotiations were Mrs. Clarissa Morris, president, and Mrs. Alma Kower, secretary.

The city has appropriated \$100 for expenses of surmounting the fountain with an incandescent light.
